Found in the Fells, July

As June turns into July, a group of closely related forest floor plants that have been slowly developing their buds since early spring finally flower. First pipsissewa and round-leaved pyrola, sometimes flowering side-by-side, will bloom in late June, early July. They are both in the plant family called *Pyrolaceae*. The flowers of pipsissewa (*Chimaphila umbellata*) are quite unusual and worth a close look with a large green stubby style and psychedelic pink ring at the base, surrounded by the stamens looking like the chairs of a miniature carousel.

And then ten days or so later, usually towards the third week of July in the Fells, blooms the close cousin of pipsissewa, spotted wintergreen (*Chimaphila maculata*) whose beautiful leaves I, for one, have been admiring all year long. Some guidebooks will tell you that these two plants bloom the other way around. Not in the Fells, anyway. The flowers of spotted


wintergreen are almost identical to pipsissewa but there is no pink ring at the base of the style. Rather, the red pigment is used up in giving the flower stems a deep red color.

Also in the second half of the month, the delightful evergreen teaberry finally blooms.

But, talking of berries, July is blueberry time. My wife, Anne, and I picked three and half pounds near Wright's Pond in just over an hour. Early in July, low-bush blueberries (*Vaccinium angustifolium*) and middle- to third-week pale blueberries will be ripe (*V. pallidum*) with long clusters on somewhat higher bushes. There's enough for everyone's need but not for everyone's greed.

In damp situations, tall meadow rue is prevalent, and on the shores of ponds look for the distinctive buttonbush, and a splash of pink might be the swamp rose. Towards the end of the month, the heavily-scented sweet pepperbush blooms.

It's almost time for the VERT Sasquatch - a Fells tradition! Come join us on July 9th as either a runner or a volunteer!

◀ The path to the Cascades leads from Washington Street between Melrose and Malden. That street is peppered with old former factories. Here a power house chimney is repurposed as a cell phone tower.

We made it to the Cascades, but the water flow was just a trickle. ▶

Here's a closer look at the face of the Cascades. Can you spot the trickle? ▶



◀ The trail climbs up just south of the Cascades, steep and rocky with a switchback or two. Up there, you can see the streams are still flowing. They just spread out as they reach the edge.

The stream hits a number of flat rocks near the edge of the main cascades. As we crossed them, we avoided wet rocks as they tend to get a patina moss due the continuous water. One unsure step and you're down. ▶



At the top we took the more difficult Rock Circuit, blazed white, if only because it headed south. The easier route started out northwest but led down to the Black Rock Path and straight south. The Rock Circuit climbs up to every high point in the Eastern Fells. For example, here is a higher view of the repurposed cell tower we saw earlier. ►



▲ Whenever I am in the Fells and able to see out over the Boston area, I am always amazed at how small the cities seem. In this case, Melrose, in the sea of green.



Although our educational programming has quadrupled this year in size (from a simple morning Forest Kindergarten program in 2014–15 to both a morning-and-afternoon Forest Kindergarten, and an Explorers and Adventurers session, for a combined youth age range from 4 to 12), our low staff-to-student ratio has remained focused and attentive.

Top of the Tank

The Spot Pond Covered Reservoir and Pump Station is officially open to the public. A great time was had by all on Saturday, June 18th, at the Top of the Tank Ribbon Cutting. The Friends of the Fells, joined by the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority, DCR, Senator Jason Lewis, Representative Paul Donato, Representative Michael Day, Stoneham Selectwoman Caroline Colarusso and Chairwoman Ann Marie O'Neill, and Alderman John Tramontozzi of Melrose were present in full force to mark the occasion.

The MWRA started using the 20-million-gallon covered tank in November. It provides storage for Charlestown, Chelsea, Everett, Malden, Medford and Somerville, and system redundancy for 21 communities. Fred Laskey, Executive Director of the MWRA, gave a shout-out to former Friends of the Fells

Executive Director Mike Ryan for his support in getting the project rolling in this location.

The MWRA has opened a network of covered tanks over the last decade, which keep your water protected. The century-old open reservoirs are still maintained for emergency back-up. The new covered reservoir features a grassy meadow with native wildflowers—a Friends of the Fells botany advisor, Walter Kittredge, consulted on the selection. It is surrounded by a gravel walking path and a bridge to the Fells with short hikes to the scenic Virginia Wood and the upper reservoir.

Many thanks to Fred Laskey, and his team and volunteers Bryan Hamlin (Friends Board member), Anne Hamlin, Lindsay Beal (Friends Board member), Jake Kostick, Craig Beal and Adrian Emery for making the event such a success!

Social Innovation Forum by Sheri Qualters

Friends of the Fells leaders recently learned a lot about putting the organization’s best foot forward by taking part in a pilot boot camp program for innovative nonprofits that work on environmental sustainability.

The Friends “graduated” from the nine-week program by participating in a June 23 pitch meeting and networking event at District Hall in Boston’s Seaport District. Executive Director Neil Anderson was tasked with delivering a three-minute talk to roughly 100 investors, philanthropists, community partners, and stakeholders. Anderson covered a lot of ground in that timed speech. Longstanding and innovative Friends programs, the plans to expand youth offerings and the Trail Adopter Program, and our

vision for improving accessibility for people with disabilities were just a few of his topics.

The Friends was among a group of eight nonprofits that made it through the boot camp and made presentations at the Solutions for a Sustainable Community: Creating a Greener Greater Boston breakfast event.

Two Boston-based entities teamed up to offer the boot camp: the Social Innovation Forum, which connects innovative nonprofits and social impact businesses to investors, supporters and in-kind partners; and the Schrafft Charitable Trust, a private family foundation that gives grants to nonprofits focused on educating disadvantaged youth. Boot camp taught participants how to boost organizational visibility,

expand networks and improve operations.

The nonprofits learned at weekly training workshops run by Social Innovation Forum staff and business and nonprofit leaders, and from forum supporters who served as one-on-one coaches.

The Friends’ Executive Director Neil Anderson said the organization was “incredibly honored” to be selected for the program.

“It was an amazing nine weeks in which we were connected with some incredible innovators from across the nonprofit sector and were able, with the help of skilled coaches, to really develop our messaging in a concise way that will help us in the year ahead to broaden our support base and deepen our impact,” Anderson said.

Langwood Commons Update

Friends of the Fells returned to the Appeals Court last month to seek a ruling that would require developers of the proposed Langwood Commons project to complete a MEPA environmental impact review.

At the June 20 hearing, the Friends attorney, Barry Fogel of Keegan Werlin LLP, argued that unless developers comply with the January 2006 MEPA ruling, the Fells Spot Pond district would be swamped in traffic that would require conversion of parkways into dense highways. The ruling called for presentation

of a “reduced-build alternative... able to be accommodated by the parkways with minimum adverse impacts.”
